

# **LOGLINE**

A humiliated teen who was scammed out of his savings turns his sneaker "support group" into a viral verification movement, only to risk everything—and everyone he cares about—when the line between clout and community blurs.

# **TONE**

Gritty, authentic, and emotionally charged with the propulsive energy of a tech thriller. Think The Social Network meets Creed meets Atlanta.

# **THEME**

Authenticity in a Hype-Driven World: The search for what's real—in the products we buy, the stories we tell, and the people we become.

#### **PITCH**

Sneakerheads Anonymous is a coming-of-age drama for the Gen Z era, set in the high-stakes, billion-dollar world of sneaker culture. It's the story of Jayden, who turns his public shame into a mission to protect his community from the fakes and frauds that prey on them. But as his movement explodes, he must confront a dangerous rival, internal betrayal, and his own compromises, learning that building something real is harder than spotting a fake pair of Jordans. This is a story about the cost of integrity, the weight of leadership, and the scars we hide behind the hype.

#### **DETAILED SYNOPSIS**

ACT I: After being brutally scammed at a sneaker con, Jayden is broke and humiliated. To save his grades, he pitches a "support group" for sneaker obsession, a safe space for teens to confess their "retail sins." He's joined by the pragmatic Shay, who sees the group's stories as valuable data. They formalize their unique skill set into "Sneakerheads Anonymous," a verification system where every pair and every story must be real. A viral video makes Jayden an underground hero, but also draws the ire of the establishment and a shadowy figure from the past, Big Tony.

ACT II: The group's success is its downfall. The community fractures under new rules and the pressure of being a public watchdog. A heartbreaking mistake—verifying a fake pair for a sick kid—shatters their credibility. Simultaneously, they are threatened with legal action from sneaker brands and shutdown by the school. Big Tony, a kingpin of the fake circuit, infiltrates the group, exploiting their chaos to launch his own corporate, sanitized version of their idea. Jayden's relationships with Shay, his uncle Greg, and his members fracture under the pressure.

ACT III: Exposed, suspended, and alienated, Jayden must dismantle what he built. Guided by his uncle Greg—a former Nike designer with his own regrets—Jayden reconnects with his core crew. They abandon the hype and return to their roots: authentic, human connection. In a final confrontation, they expose Big Tony's manipulation not with clout, but with cold, hard proof. The group reboots, smaller and quieter, no longer a movement but a true community, having learned that trust isn't a viral metric—it's built one honest step at a time.

JAYDEN	17	The idealistic, passionate, and flawed protagonist. His arc is from seeking external validation to understanding internal integrity. A natural leader who must learn humility.
SHAY	18	The strategic, ambitious tech-brain of the operation. Her arc is from seeing people as data points to valuing their stories. She represents the tension between growth and ethics.
GREG	40s	Jayden's uncle and guardian. A former Nike designer who left the industry disillusioned. He is the moral compass, haunted by his own past compromises.
BIG TONY	30s	The antagonist. A charismatic and ruthless kingpin of the fake sneaker world. He doesn't want to destroy S.A.; he wants to corporatize and own its credibility.
KEV	18	The heart of the group. Loyal and funny, he keeps the group grounded. His financial struggles provide emotional stakes.
