LOGLINE

Sharp Glass Southern Gothic meets **Big Little Lies**—lush, atmospheric, and psychologically complex with underlying menace. Think the visual elegance of **Bridgerton** with the moral complexity of **When They See Us** and the family secrets of **Succession**.

THEME

Inherited Trauma & Moral Courage - How do we reconcile loving our families while confronting their sins? The story explores generational guilt, the price of privilege, and whether redemption is possible when built on others' suffering.

THE PITCH

It's 2025, but the ghosts of 1954 won't stay buried. Caroline Beaumont has everything—money, status, a debutante ball that's her coronation into Southern aristocracy. But when a mysterious stranger gives her evidence that her beloved grandmother murdered a woman and let an innocent Black musician hang for it, Caroline's perfect world shatters.

This isn't just about one family's secrets—it's about how entire systems protect themselves by sacrificing the vulnerable. As Caroline digs deeper, she discovers the conspiracy involves judges, newspapers, and the very pillars of her community.

DETAILED SYNOPSIS

ACT I: PERFECT FACADE
